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Dry Eye Relief Instructions

Dry Eye Syndrome (DES) is a problem Dr. Fucigna and his staff will help you with. It occurs when the eye does not produce enough tears. Ironically, people may have a lot of tearing with DES. A sufficient tear film allows us to have good vision; without it, blurriness and irritation may occur. Common symptoms include: scratchiness and grittiness, excessive tearing, and tiredness at the end of the day.

Dry Eye Syndrome can be a result of systemic medications, eye procedures, and staring at the computer screen. *It can be worsened with increased screen time on computers because we don't blink*. Eye dryness can be measured in our office through a special Tear Lab test with immediate results. Dr. Fucigna has some simple suggestions to help you with DES:

Multi-step Approach

1. Artificial tears help lubricate your eye, similar to your own tears, and is used as often as needed

-Can be purchased over-the-counter, found at most drug stores

-If you are sensitive to preservatives, preservative-free drops are available

-A HINT: To improve efficacy, you may keep your artificial tears wherever needed: on your keyboard, in your car, next to your toothbrush, etc.

2. Flax Seed Capsules of at least 1000mg by mouth

-Over-the-counter jelly capsule supplement taken orally, separate from flax seeds you might add to your everyday meals

3. Punctal Plugs can be inserted into the tear drain (punctum) to help keep tear fluid in the eye

-Dr. Fucigna will gently place the plug into the upper or lower eyelid and it will act as a stopper, like in a bathtub, to raise the amount of tear fluid

4. Prescription eye drops, which stimulate tear production (you may see advertised: Restasis, Xiidra, or Cequa)

-Time and cost commitment as they need to be used twice a day

-Effectiveness increases after at least one month and following plug placement

-A HINT: Single use vials can be used for more than one day if kept covered and standing up in a shot glass in your refrigerator
